Research Objectives & Methodology

- / In the lead up to the 2016 General Election, Newstalk are interested in learning more about the issues of concern for the Irish population.
- / The results detailed in this report are in reference to questions asked on the Irish Economy
- / Based on these objectives, the study required a nationally representative view and as such our telephone omnibus was the research methodology used.
- / The RED Express is our high speed telephone omnibus survey which is representative of all Irish adults aged 18+.
- / A sample of 1,008 adults aged 18+ were interviewed.
- / Fieldwork took place between 8th-11th February 2016.
- / Respondents were reached using a mix RDD (Random Digital Dial) landline and mobile phone sample. This ensures we reach 98% of population including mobile phone only households, landline only households and dual phone households.
- / Quotas were set and data weighted to know profiles on age, gender, class and region to ensure that the sample is representative of the total Irish adult population.

To Be Included in Press Release

Method

RED C interviewed a random representative sample of 1,008 adults aged 18+ by phone between the 8th and 11th February 2016.

- A random digit dial (RDD) method of mobile and landline numbers was utilized in order to ensure a random selection of households to be included – this ensures all adults were eligible for selection including mobile only households and ex-directory households.
- » Interviews were conducted across the country and the results weighted to the profile of all adults.







Nationally Representative Sample Profile





Key Findings & Summary

- / Public attitudes as to where the government should focus from a budgetary point of view are quite polarised.
- / In total over half of all adults claim to be in favour of investment in both expenditure on public service (36%) and reducing the national debt (20%), while the rest are more in favour of reducing the tax burden either through abolishing the Universal Social Charge (33%) or further Tax Cuts (10%).
- / Those in Dublin, from more professional and clerical backgrounds, and older age groups are most in favour of investment, while cuts are more favoured by those in the middle 35-54 year olds aged groups.
- / Just over 2 in 5 claim that they have actually felt the benefit of the recovery, primarily coming from more professional and clerical households, those in younger 18-34 year old age groups and those living in Dublin.
- / It is no surprise as a result that most adults (79%) believe that any economic recovery has been on a two tier bases, particularly among those living in Connaught and Ulster regions of the country.
- / While the perception among many (61%) is that the economic recovery is here to stay for at least the next 5 years, there is some uncertainty around this figure; with only 22% very sure in their belief that it will last the next 5 years.
- / When asked opinions about various possible tax changes or incentives, there is universal agreement that businesses should be incentivised for creating jobs in Rural Ireland this is the case across all demographics.
- / Measures to promote long term rental agreements are also favourably viewed with 86% believe they should be promoted particularly among those aged 25-34, arguably key renting age groups.
- / While tax relief on childcare costs are also favoured by a significant proportion of all adults (83%), which rises to 87% among those with dependent children.
- / The majority (77%) agree that mortgage regulations need to be reviewed to make it easier to get on the property ladder or trade up this is especially significant among this core audience of those aged 18-34 and lower social grades.
- / While, extending social housing to 20% of all new developments should also be restored, according to 3 in 4 of all adults, especially those from more working class background and those living in Dublin.
- / There is however much less agreement (36%) with the notion that returning emigrants might receiving a preferential tax rate. However agreement is higher among those potentially more affected, aged 18-24.







Believe The Government Should Focus Expenditure On **Public Services** From A Budgetary Point Of View










Believe The Government Should Focus On Reducing The **National Debt** From A Budgetary Point Of View

Believe The Government Should Abolish The **Universal Social Charge** From A Budgetary Point Of View













Believe The Government Should Focus Or Tax Cuts From A Budgetary Point Of View Believe The Government Should Focus On Further



There is clearly a belief that any recovery to date has been on a two tier bases, among almost 4 in 5. Positive news is that 3 in 5 believe that any return of economic growth is here to stay for at least 5 years — while less positive is that just over 2 in 4 claim to have felt the economic recovery personally.








Agree That They Have **Felt The Benefit** Of Economic Recovery In Their Lives










Agree That Any Economic Recovery To Date Is On A **Two Tier** Basis, Meaning It Is Benefiting Some And Not Others



Agree That The Return Of Economic Growth Is **Here To Stay** For At Least The Next 5 Years














Agree That Businesses Setting Up Or Creating Jobs In Rural Ireland Should Be Incentivised






Agree That Measures Should Be Introduced To Promote Long Term Rental Agreements In Ireland




Agree That Tax Relief On Childcare Costs Should Be Introduced In Ireland






Agree That Mortgage Regulations Should Be Reviewed To Make It Easier For Buyers To Get On The Property Market Or To Trade Up

















Agree That Requirements To Make Social Housing Available In All New Housing Developments Should Be Restored To 20%














Agree That Emigrants Who Are Returning To Ireland To Work Should Be Given A Preferential Tax Rate


