



General Election & Presidential Election Vote Intention Opinion Poll

October 2018





Methodology and Weighting

- / RED C interviewed a random sample of 1000 adults aged 18+ by telephone between the 3rd-10th October 2018.
- / A random digit dial (RDD) method is used to ensure a random selection process of households to be included this also ensures that ex-directory households are covered.
- / Half of the sample are interviewed using an RDD landline sample, with the other half conducted using an RDD mobile phone sample, this ensures 98% coverage of the population reaching landline only households, mobile only households and those with both a landline and a mobile.
- / Interviews were conducted across the country and the results weighted to the profile of all adults. A further past vote weighting is included that takes the recall for how people voted at the <u>last election</u>, compares this to the actual results and weights the data between the two.
- / Vote intention results are weighted based on turnout, including both how likely each respondent is to actually go and vote on a 10 point scale, where 1 is not at all likely and 10 is very likely, as well as whether or not they voted in the last general election.
- / In all respects the poll was completed to the opinion polling guidelines set out by both ESOMAR and AIMRO.







Paddy Power Poll – Presidential Election

- 1. The challengers have not gained any ground on the incumbent in the race for the Irish presidency. Michael D commands a first preference share of 70%, an increase of 3% versus a RED C poll in September, dominating other candidates in the race for presidency.
- 2. Higgins remains very popular amongst younger cohorts, earning the first preference vote of 83% of 18-34 year olds, while achieving roughly two thirds of first preference of those 35 and over.
- 3. The president also commands highest support among supporters of Fine Gael (78%) and Labour (85%), and while the majority of Fianna Fail (58%) and Sinn Fein(55%) voters agree.
- 4. However 1 in 4 (26%) Fianna Fail supporters would prefer Sean Gallagher, while 1 in 3 Sinn Fein voters support the SF candidate Liadh Ní Riada.
- 5. Sean Gallagher continues to hold second place with 14% (-1), but does not show any signs of improvement since Sept.
- 6. Possible future consideration has dropped for Gallagher has versus last month and is only just above the stated first preference support at 15%, implying he has limited room for growth without something drastic occurring on the campaign trail.
- 7. The rest of the field Joan Freeman, Liadh Ní Riada and Gavin Duffy have yet to make a mark on the Irish electorate, with all securing less than 10% of the first preference vote.

- 8. Joan Freeman has seen an increase of +3% versus last month bringing her to 6% overall, whereas Gavin Duffy is moving in the opposite direction at 4% (-2).
- 9. There is an overwhelming consensus (89%) that their should be a full and detailed account of the expenditure within the office of the presidency.
- 10. Two thirds (65%) believe that Michael D's salary of a quarter of a million is much two high that said, 1 in 3 disagree. While sentiment is consistent amongst most demographics, Sinn Fein Voters (86%) and those in lower socio-economic groups are much more likely to agree that the current salary is inflated.




Paddy Power Poll – General Election & Brexit

General Election Vote Intention

- 1. Fine Gael still command the largest share of first preference votes in October with 32% (-1) and despite showing a very marginal downward trend in recent polls, they consistently have the support of about a third of the population during 2018.
- 2. After dropping somewhat in the RED C September recent poll, Fianna Fail support gains during October at the expense of Fine Gael, Labour, Independents and Social Dems.
- 3. Sinn Fein continues to record similar levels of support seen by the party at the last election in RED C polls, which take account of turnout. Their traditional heartland among younger voters has been somewhat lost to FG.
- 4. Smaller parties appear to have suffered more recently in terms of first preference support, but this could be turned around in any campaign where the focus comes back to ALL parties.






Presidential Election Poll

Claimed likelihood to vote is lower than for a General Election, but not markedly so.












First Preference x Region










The President of Ireland should be obliged to provide full and detailed accounts for their expenditure and they should be automatically made available to the public













